# **East Africa Rice Conference 2021**

Inclusive and Sustainable Rice System Development: Opportunities and Challenges 18-20 May 2021

#### BACKGROUND

Africa has become a major consumer of rice with an estimated annual import cost of 5-6 billion USD. Between 2010 and 2035, an additional 116 million tons of milled rice will be needed worldwide to meet this increasing demand, of which 30 million tons will be needed for Africa.<sup>1</sup>

The potential for growth in Africa's rice sector is enormous. A rapid increase in the area for rice, irrigated as well as rainfed, is necessary. In particular, it is vital to expand the irrigated areas as only 17% of the rice-growing areas in Africa is currently irrigated. Average yield is extremely low-at 1.0 to 2.5 ton per ha-which can at least be doubled. If proper interventions are in place, the existing potential of Africa can enable the region to produce more than its needs for consumption, allowing it to become self-sufficient or even a rice exporter. In recent years, many rice-growing countries in Africa have formulated or revised their National Rice Development Strategy (NRDS) through the facilitation of the Coalition for African Rice Development (CARD). Through the implementation of NRDS, each country has been trying to develop its rice sector, with support from development partners and involvement of the private sector. In East Africa, the East Africa Rice Development Strategy (EARDS) is under formulation, led by the East African Community (EAC), to capture the opportunity of increasing demand for rice as a region.

Considering the increasing importance of rice in Africa in general and in East Africa in particular, it will be important to discuss and share experiences among countries in relation to the existing challenges and emerging opportunities, in the effort to ensure adequate domestic production to fulfill the ever-increasing demand, thus the inception of the East Africa Rice Conference (EARC) 2021.

The conference will build upon previous efforts and discussions toward achieving agricultural growth, food and nutrition security, and rural development as outlined in the Comprehensive Africa Agricultural Development Programme (CAADP). Additionally, it is an opportunity to revisit progress towards the 2014 Malabo Declaration on Accelerated Agricultural Growth and Transformation for Shared Prosperity and Improved Livelihoods commitments adopted by African Union (AU) Heads of State and Government, including but not limited to ending hunger, improving resilience of livelihoods and production systems, and ensuring that agriculture plays a significant role in reducing poverty in the region.

In particular, the Conference will serve as a platform to consolidate the collective efforts of the key players in the rice sector in the region and discuss important topics surrounding these identified themes: (a) rice research and development, (b) inclusive markets & value chains, (c) rice-based livelihoods: gender and youth integration, (d) integrated rice sector development in a changing climate, (e) inclusive finance & investment, and (f) agricultural policy & reforms. The discussions surrounding these themes will help countries to strategically align their national priorities to realize the urgent need to transform food systems and build back better from the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic to end hunger and malnutrition while ensuring that food systems are sustainable and inclusive.

The outcomes of the discussions will also be made available in preparation for the United Nations Food Systems Summit 2021 happening in September or October.

This Conference will bring together key players in Africa's rice sector—governments, development partners, civil society including youth and farmers groups, the research community and academe, donors and investors, and the private sector.

Initially, the conference was designed for a large in-person gathering but in light of the pandemic, the organizers decided to conduct the conference through a hybrid of virtual and in person events, following all health and safety protocols.

#### **CONFERENCE OBJECTIVES**

- To facilitate knowledge exchange on rice sector research and development at national and regional levels;
- 2. To take stock of public, private, and donorsupported initiatives to inform policy-making and implementation; and
- 3. To boost multi-stakeholder collaboration toward achieving national and regional rice self-sufficiency, increasing food and nutrition security, and alleviating poverty through inclusive and sustainable production and commercialization.

#### CONFERENCE PARTICIPANTS

Participation for the virtual conference is planned for around 500-1,000 attendees. For the simultaneous onsite country workshops, around 15-20 participants will be invited in Burundi, Rwanda, and Uganda while 30-35 participants will be invited in Ethiopia, Kenya, and Tanzania.

#### **CONFERENCE STRUCTURE**

To realize the conference objectives, the 3-day conference will be a hybrid of face-to-face and virtual events. It will start with the 1-day simultaneous onsite country workshops in six countries in East Africa: Tanzania, Kenya, Ethiopia, Uganda, Burundi, and Rwanda, followed by a 2-day virtual event.
